Treaty of Peace and lendship made at Ruby Valley, in the Territory Oct. 1, 1863.

of Nevada, this fixlay of October, A. D. one thousand eight hundred and sixty-th, between the United States of America, represented by the underned commissioners, and the Western Bands of Proclaimed 1061, 21, 1863.

the Shoshonee Nav of Indians, represented by their Chief's and Principal Hen an Varriors, as follows:

ARTICLE 1.

Peace and friends shall be hereafter established and maintained depredations to rease. between the Westerlands of the Shoshonee nation and the people and Government of United States; and the said bands stipulate and agree that hostilities all depredations upon the emigrant trains, the mail and telegraph is, and upon the citizens of the United States within their countriball cease.

ARTICLE 2.

The several router travel through the Shoshonee country, now or fender: salety of travel; of hereafter, used by we men, shall be forever free, and unobstructed cless, by the said bands, fine use of the government of the United States. and of all emigrants I travellers under its authority and protection. without molestation injury from them. And if depredations are at any time committed bad men of their nation, the offenders shall be immediately taken a delivered up to the proper officers of the United States, to be punishes their offences shall deserve; and the safety of all travellers pass peaceably over either of said routes is hereby guarantiad by said ids guarantied by said ids.

ARTICLE 3.

telegraph and overland stage lines having been established and opted by companies under the authority of the United States through opted by companies under the authority of the United States through a tof the Shoshonee country, it is expressly agreed that the same more continued without hindrance, molestation, or injury from the pae of said bands, and that their property and the lives and properof passengers in the stages and of the employes of the respective coanies, shall be protected by them. And further, it being undersut that provision has been made by the government of the United Sts for the construction of a railway from the plains west to the Pac ocean, it is stipulated by the said bands that the said railway or branches may be located, constructed, and operated, and without unstation from them, through any portion of country claimed or opied by them. opied by them.

ARTICLE 4.

is further agreed by the parties hereto, that the Shoshonee country n be explored and prospected for gold and silver, or other minerals; a when mines are discovered, they may be worked, and mining and acultural settlements formed, and ranches established whenever t' may be required. Mills may be erected and timber taken for truse, as also for building and other purposes in any part of the citry claimed by said bands.

ARTICLE 5.

Boundaries of west-ern bands of Shosho-ni.

is understood that the boundaries of the country claimed and apied by said bands are defined and described by them as follows:

In the north by Wong-goga-da Mountains and Shoshonee River Ney; on the west by Su-non-to-yah Mountains or Smith Creek Intains; on the south by Wi-co-bah and the Colorado Desert; on teast by Po-ho-no-be Valley or Steptoe Valley and Great Salt Lake

ARTICLE 6.

Reservations be established.

may he said bands agree that whenever the President of the United tes shall deem it expedient for them to abandon the roaming life, ich, they now lead, and become herdsmen or agriculturalists, he is by authorized to make such reservations for their use as he may on necessary within the country above described; and they do also eby agree to remove their camps to such reservations as he may icute, and to reside and remain therein.

ARTICLE 7.

Annuity, accept the United States, being aware of the inconvenience resulting to the muce of, as compensation in consequence of the driving away and destruction of game tion for loss of game. It is not consequence of the driving away and destruction of game ng the routes travelled by white men, and by the formation of agritural and mining settlements, are willing to fairly compensate them the same; therefore, and in consideration of the preceding stiptions, and of their faithful observance by the said bands, the United ites promise and agree to pay to the said bands of the Shoshonee ion parties hereto, annually for the term of twenty years, the sum five thousand dollars in such articles, including cattle for herding other purposes, as the President of the United States shall deem table for their wants and condition, either as hunters or herdsmen. d the said bands hereby acknowledge the reception of the said stipated annuities as a full compensation and equivalent for the loss of ne and the rights and privileges hereby conceded.
